
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I. MESSAGE FROM THE CEO

In the field of election management and delivery, 2024 was known globally as The Year of Elections. Approximately half of the world's population had the opportunity to cast a ballot in 2024. Common challenges were seen by election management bodies around the globe, such as disinformation and cybersecurity threats that cast doubt on the fairness of elections. More than ever before, this has re-emphasized the importance of election integrity.

To meet the test of these challenging times, Elections Manitoba remains steadfast in our commitment to delivering free and fair elections. This commitment is guided by a clear and comprehensive vision of election integrity, built on the following principles:





These principles guide our work throughout the four-year election cycle. In first phase of this cycle, beginning immediately after a general election, we focus on evaluation and review. 2024 saw Elections Manitoba wrap up that phase and turn our focus to delivery of the next election.

Through the evaluation and planning processes of the first phase, we find opportunities to strengthen the delivery of electoral services and build the resilience needed to adapt to emerging challenges — reinforcing our commitment to election integrity.

Considering the scope of election modernization in recent years — changes to legislation and technological implementation — and the changing electoral environment, we took the additional step in 2024 of engaging in a more thorough organizational review. The purpose of this review was to assess how, as an organization, Elections Manitoba can manage the delivery of increasingly complex election events in light of a changing environment and emerging threats.

As the result of this review and analysis, we have identified multiple ways to bolster organizational effectiveness. We have already begun modifying roles and responsibilities to keep pace with election modernization. We have also identified the need for additional resources to safeguard the smooth and secure delivery of election events.

The completion of this work brings us into the next phase of the election cycle, which focuses on building the foundation of the next general election.

We developed a new strategic plan to guide us through the next general election, identifying the strategic focus areas that will allow us to deliver on our mandate, mission and vision. We have begun building out this blueprint through project planning and resource alignment. This work will strengthen our organizational effectiveness, enhance service and enable inclusivity and accessibility, all while upholding the integrity of the electoral process and public confidence.



I. MESSAGE DE LA DIRECTRICE GÉNÉRALE DES ÉLECTIONS

Dans le domaine de la gestion et de la conduite des élections, 2024 a été mondialement reconnue comme étant une année électorale historique. Environ la moitié de la population mondiale a eu l'occasion de voter en 2024. Les organismes de gestion électorale de partout dans le monde ont fait face à des défis communs – dont la désinformation et les menaces à la cybersécurité qui ont jeté le doute sur l'équité électorale. Plus que jamais auparavant, l'importance d'assurer l'intégrité des élections a été réaffirmée.

Pour relever ces défis, Élections Manitoba travaille à pied d'œuvre pour garantir la tenue d'élections libres et équitables qui repose sur une vision claire et globale de l'intégrité électorale s'articulant autour des principes suivants.





Ces principes orientent notre travail tout au long d'un cycle électoral de quatre années. Au cours de la phase initiale de ce cycle, qui commence immédiatement après la tenue d'une élection générale, l'essentiel de notre travail consiste à évaluer et à examiner le processus électoral qui vient de prendre fin.

En 2024, Élections Manitoba a achevé cette phase initiale avant de concentrer son attention sur la conduite de la prochaine élection.

Durant les activités d'évaluation et de planification de la phase initiale du cycle électoral, nous avons cerné des moyens de renforcer la prestation des services électoraux et d'accroître la résilience face aux défis émergents, renforçant ainsi notre engagement à l'égard de l'intégrité électorale.

Devant l'ampleur des initiatives de modernisation électorale mises en œuvre au cours des dernières années – modification de la législation et mise en œuvre technologique – et compte tenu de l'évolution du contexte électoral, nous avons effectué un examen organisationnel plus approfondi en 2024. L'objectif de cet examen était d'évaluer comment, en tant qu'organisme, Élections Manitoba pouvait gérer la conduite d'élections d'une complexité grandissante dans un environnement en pleine évolution et dans un contexte de menaces émergentes.

Notre examen et notre analyse nous ont permis de cerner une multitude de façons de renforcer notre efficacité organisationnelle. Nous avons déjà commencé à modifier nos rôles et responsabilités en fonction de l'évolution de la modernisation électorale. Nous avons également établi la nécessité de ressources supplémentaires pour garantir la conduite efficace et sécuritaire des activités électorales.

La phase initiale du cycle électoral étant terminée, nous amorçons maintenant la phase suivante qui consiste à bâtir les fondations de la prochaine élection générale.

Nous avons conçu un nouveau plan stratégique qui nous guidera tout au long de la prochaine élection générale et qui énonce les domaines d'intérêt stratégique sur lesquels nous nous appuyerons pour remplir notre mandat, notre mission et notre vision. Pour amorcer la mise en œuvre de notre plan stratégique, nous avons mis en branle un processus de planification de projets et d'affectation de ressources. Le travail effectué renforcera l'efficacité de notre organisme, améliorera nos services et favorisera l'inclusion et l'accessibilité, ce qui contribuera du même coup à préserver l'intégrité du processus électoral et la confiance du public.

En vertu des dispositions législatives manitobaines sur les élections à date fixe, la prochaine élection générale provinciale est prévue pour le mardi 5 octobre 2027. Nous nous appuyerons sur les fondations que nous avons commencé à bâtir en 2024 pour délivrer avec succès à la population manitobaine une élection libre, équitable, accessible et sécuritaire.



II. STRATEGIC PLANNING

In 2024, Elections Manitoba completed a strategic planning exercise to update and refocus our approach to delivering free, fair and accessible electoral services. The strategic plan for 2025 – 2029 renews our mission, vision, and values, while setting new strategic focus areas. This new plan builds upon our accomplishments and serves as the compass that guides Elections Manitoba through an evolving electoral landscape.

This plan also reflects a shift from an event delivery model towards ongoing electoral service delivery and a commitment to continuous improvement and learning, in an increasingly complex electoral environment.

Strategic Focus Areas



Uphold Integrity and Public Confidence

To enable free and fair elections, Elections Manitoba is investing in additional infrastructure and resources to be proactive in identifying and protecting against threats to democracy and increasing transparency to compliance. We consistently monitor and assess threats to the democratic process and will communicate how we address and anticipate threats. In addition, we will ensure overall compliance to legislative mandate.



Strengthen Organizational Effectiveness

To safeguard public use of funds and foster a culture of continuous improvement, Elections Manitoba will be investing more in the capacity and capabilities of our staff and organization. We will continue to refine and streamline administrative processes in support of electoral service excellence. Drawing on sound management practices that promote collaborative teamwork, we will develop staff skillsets, build integrated project plans, and ensure open and consistent channels of communication at all levels so information flows smoothly and efficiently.



Enhance Service and Ongoing Engagement

To modernize electoral services and enable meaningful communication and interaction with vested parties, Elections Manitoba is committed to a responsive service mindset that addresses needs and enables access to information. We will expand online functionality to increase transparency and will continue to work regularly with our people and organizations to support democracy for Manitoba.




Enable Inclusivity and Accessibility

To reflect the diversity of communities and fulfil our commitment to truth and reconciliation, Elections Manitoba designs services and programs that provide the environment for equitable and accessible opportunities for Manitobans. We will continue to actively listen to the needs and expectations of voters to ensure electoral services address barriers and are responsive to unique requirements.

III. ELECTION MODERNIZATION

Elections Manitoba continues to build on the successful implementation of our three-step modernization vision to expand service and voting opportunities. The goal of this vision is to give voters the opportunity to cast their ballot at any polling place in the province on election day.

VISION: Vote Anywhere in Manitoba



In 2024, an important step was reached in making this vision a reality for Manitoba voters. A proposal to modify the voting process was approved by the Standing Committee on Legislative Affairs, pursuant to section 28.1(5) of *The Elections Act*, for use in the next general election and any byelection before then.

This modification allows voters to cast a ballot in any electoral division in the province at the local election office on election day. The modification also extends advance voting for an additional two days at the local election office (the Sunday and Monday immediately preceding election day).

This modification was tested in the Transcona byelection, held on March 18, 2025. A report on the use of the modification is included in this report. Detailed byelection results are published in the Transcona Byelection Statement of Votes. Reports on the conduct of the byelection, as well as financial reporting, will be included Election Manitoba’s 2025 annual report.



IV. ELECTION ACTIVITIES

43rd General Election Campaign Financing

Requirements under Legislation

To support the fairness and transparency of the electoral process, *The Election Financing Act* requires candidates and registered parties to report their financial activity during an election period. These audited financial statements are filed with Elections Manitoba and published here and online at www.electionsmanitoba.ca.

In total, 201 candidates (188 official and 13 who withdrew) and six registered parties were required to file returns for the 2023 general election. The filing deadline for financial statements was February 5, 2024.

Reporting by Candidates

Candidates must report their financial activity during the candidacy period. The candidacy period begins when a candidate files nomination papers, under either *The Election Financing Act* or *The Elections Act*, and ends two months after election day or the day the candidate withdraws.

Financial statements filed by candidates must include:

- ▶ Auditor's report
- ▶ Income, transfers and expenses
- ▶ Assets and liabilities
- ▶ Contributions
- ▶ Supporting documentation

Reporting by Registered Parties

Registered parties must also report their financial activity during the campaign period. For registered parties, the campaign period begins when the writ of election is issued until two months after election day.

Financial statements filed by registered parties must include:

- ▶ Auditor's report
- ▶ Audited statement of income, transfers and expenses

Expense Limits

Expense limits help ensure a level playing field for political participants. *The Election Financing Act* limits spending for candidates and registered parties in two ways during an election:

- ▶ Advertising expense limits
- ▶ Election expense limits

Advertising expenses are subject to a separate limit but contribute to the total election expense limit.

These expense limits are calculated by multiplying an expense limit per registered voter by the number of registered voters in an electoral division.

For candidates, the number of registered voters refers to the electoral division in which they are running. For registered parties, the limits reflect the number of electoral divisions in which they are running candidates.

Candidates and parties are also subject to a limit on advertising expenses during the 90-day pre-election period. First introduced in 2017, this limit applies to fixed-date elections. Since the 2019 general election was a non-fixed date election, 2023 was the first time this limit applied.

The 90-day pre-election period advertising expense limits are set by *The Election Financing Act* and indexed for inflation. The limits are:

- ▶ For candidates: \$8,533
- ▶ For parties: \$351,835

Party pre-election advertising expenses are reported on their annual financial statements. (see page 28).

Candidate financial statements for the 43rd general election are found in the appendix of this report (see page 47).

Contributions

Political entities may receive contributions from Manitoba residents. Contributions may be monetary or non-monetary. Non-monetary contributions include things like property and services.

The Election Financing Act places restrictions on contributions to promote financial equity and fairness.

- ▶ Contributors must be individuals who normally reside in Manitoba (organizations may not make contributions).
- ▶ Individuals must not contribute more than \$6,000 (indexed for inflation), in total, to all political entities (with an exception for leadership contests, where an additional \$3,000 per contest is allowed).
- ▶ Cash contributions must not exceed \$25.
- ▶ All contributions must be made without expectation of reimbursement or compensation.
- ▶ No reimbursement or compensation can be made.

Contributions received by parties are included in the **summary of registered parties' income, expenses and reimbursements for the 2023 general election** on page 15 of this report.



Tax Receipts

Candidates and parties may register with Elections Manitoba to issue tax receipts for contributions. Political entities that register must issue tax receipts for contributions over \$10.

The following table shows the number of candidates, by affiliation, who registered to issue tax receipts for the 2023 general election.

Reimbursements

Candidates and parties may be reimbursed up to 25% for eligible election expenses. To qualify for reimbursements, a candidate must receive 5% of valid votes in their electoral division. A registered party must receive 5% of valid votes in each of the electoral divisions where it endorsed a candidate.

Election expenses include money spent or liabilities incurred during the election period, plus non-monetary expenses, such as the value of property or services provided for free or at a discounted rate. Non-monetary expenses are not eligible for reimbursement. The election period for the 2023 general election began when the writ was issued, September 5, 2023, and ended at 8:00 pm on election day, October 3, 2023.

Candidates who receive 5% of valid votes are also eligible to be reimbursed 100% of reasonable childcare and disability related expenses. Parties can also be reimbursed for 100% of disability related expenses.

In the 2023 general election, 161 candidates and four parties were eligible for reimbursement.

Auditor Subsidies

Auditors receive subsidies for auditing financial statements that candidates and registered parties are required to submit under legislation. An auditor receives up to \$1,500 plus PST for auditing a candidate's election financial statements and up to \$30,000 plus PST for a registered party's statement. The amount of the subsidy is set by legislation.

Third Parties

The *Election Financing Act* defines a third party as a person or group, other than a registered party, candidate or constituency association, that promotes or opposes a registered party or candidate during an election.

Legislation places limits on how much a third party can spend on election communication. The limit is \$100,000 during the 90-day pre-election period and \$25,000 during the election period.

Election communication is any communication with the public during an election that supports or opposes a candidate or party, or takes a position on an issue that is associated with a candidate or registered party.

Third parties are required by legislation to register with the Chief Electoral Officer and file reports once they have spent \$2,500. They must file reports with Elections Manitoba that detail election communication spending and contributions received. Third party reports for the 2023 general election were due by January 2, 2024.

V. ANNUAL ACTIVITIES

Manitoba Voter Register Activities

The Manitoba Voter Register continues to serve as the permanent register of eligible voters and source of voters lists for election events. Since its initial use in 2019, the Manitoba Voter Register has undergone continual improvement through election events, targeted registration and revision, community events, voter self-updates, and updates from data partners.

Data Updates

Elections Manitoba receives quarterly updates to the Manitoba Voter Register through formal data sharing agreements with Elections Canada, Manitoba Public Insurance, Manitoba Health, and Vital Statistics. This data is applied to the Manitoba Voter Register to update voter information, add new voters, and remove voters who are no longer eligible from the permanent voters list.

Voters Lists

Annual Voters List

In addition to creating voters lists for election events, the Manitoba Voter Register is used to create an annual voters list. The annual voters list is distributed automatically to registered political parties, and to MLAs upon request. *The Elections Act* requires that the annual list be distributed by February 15, unless a general election was held within the past six months. Since the 2023 general election fell within that time frame, no annual voters list was sent in 2024.

Working with Other Levels of Government

Elections Manitoba also uses the Manitoba Voter Register in collaboration with other levels of government in Manitoba. Working with municipalities, community councils, and school boards, we use data from the Register to populate voters lists for other levels of government.

In 2024, Elections Manitoba produced voters lists for seven community council elections, four school division elections, and one municipal election.

Annual Voter Registration Drive

To coincide with the International Day of Democracy, Elections Manitoba holds an annual voter registration drive in the month of September to encourage Manitobans to check their voter registration status, update as needed, or register for the first time. The registration drive took the form of online advertising, a Manitoba Hydro bill insert and an in-person registration event at the University of Manitoba.

Activities Related to *The Elections Act*

EA Advisory Committee

Elections Manitoba meets with representatives from registered parties on matters relating to legislation. *The Elections Act* advisory committee met twice in 2024.

The Committee's first meeting of 2024 was on February 7. Topics discussed included the conduct of the 43rd general election and recommended amendments to *The Elections Act*.

The Committee met again on August 28, discussing the Tuxedo byelection held on June 18, 2024, voters lists and voter registration, election modernization and modifications used in the byelection, and recommendations to strengthen legislation to counter disinformation. The committee also reviewed Elections Manitoba's proposal to modify the voting process in order to extend advance voting at the local election office and allow voters to cast a ballot at any local election office in Manitoba on election day.

Public Education and Outreach

Outside of an election year, Elections Manitoba’s public education and outreach efforts are largely focused on offering in-class election education workshops through our Your Power to Choose (YPTC) program.

YPTC is designed to help students create lifelong learning skills and develop the habit of civic participation. Central to the program is the facilitator-led, in-class workshops that deliver a fun, interactive learning experience through hands-on games, activities and a mock election.

In the 2024 calendar year, 76 workshops were delivered in 37 different schools across 24 different electoral divisions. Of these workshops, 54 were delivered in English and 22 in French. Approximately 1,700 students participated in the workshops.

Registered parties and constituency associations are required under *The Election Financing Act* to report their annual financial activities to demonstrate compliance and maintain transparency with the public. Candidates must also report on outstanding liabilities and loan status.



Manitoba Tax Credits Claimed for Political Contributions

Registered parties and registered candidates may issue tax receipts for political contributions. These tax receipts may be used to claim tax credits as per section 4.11(1.2) of *The Income Tax Act*. An individual's political contribution tax credit is the lesser of \$1,000 and the amount determined according to the following table:

Total Contribution (T)	Political Contribution Credit (PCC)
\$400 or less	$PCC = .75 \times T$
\$401 to \$750	$PCC = \$300 + (T - \$400)/2$
More than \$750	$PCC = \$475 + (T - \$750)/3$

Leadership Contests

The rules and processes for how a registered party selects a leader is up to the party itself. However, *The Election Financing Act* requires public disclosure of leadership contestants' financial statements. This public disclosure enhances the fairness and transparency of how registered parties choose their leaders.

The Progressive Conservative Party of Manitoba began a leadership contest in 2024. The leadership contest period is from June 27, 2024 to June 26, 2025. The deadline for filing financial statements is July 28, 2025. Summaries of these statements will be posted on the Elections Manitoba website and be published in the 2025 annual report.

Restrictions on Government Advertising

Section 92 of *The Election Financing Act* regulates the kind of information a government department or Crown agency can publish or advertise leading up to or during election periods. Any person who believes section 92 has been violated may file a complaint with the Commissioner of Elections.

The Commissioner of Elections is an independent officer who oversees compliance with Manitoba election laws, namely *The Elections Act* and *The Election Financing Act*. The commissioner is responsible for investigations and, where appropriate, prosecution under the legislation. This includes investigating potential violations of election legislation and determining what action, if any, should be taken when a violation has occurred.

Complaints that are found to be justified by the commissioner are to be published in Elections Manitoba's annual report, as per section 93 of *The Election Financing Act*. The Commissioner reported no breaches of this type in 2024.

The Commissioner publishes the outcome of investigations of other sections of the EA and EFA in their own reports and online at www.commissionerofelections.mb.ca.

Public Interest Disclosure

The Public Interest Disclosure Act, which protects employees of government departments who disclose wrongdoing, came into effect in 2007. There have been no disclosures within Elections Manitoba, although the organization remains fully aware of the Act and is ready to ensure its regulations are met should an employee come forward with a concern.

Developing Staff and Sharing Best Practices

Elections Manitoba is committed to the ongoing development of its staff to ensure the delivery of high-quality electoral experiences and services for all Manitobans. This commitment is reflected in our strategic priority to strengthen organizational effectiveness, as outlined in our new strategic plan.

In support of this priority, Elections Manitoba undertook a comprehensive organizational review during the reporting period. The aim of the review was to assess our structure, workflows, skill sets, and future skill requirements — ensuring we are well-positioned to deliver free, fair, and accessible electoral services in an evolving electoral landscape.





To further enhance staff capacity and stay at the forefront of best practices, Elections Manitoba actively participates in a range of collaborative organizations, networks and events. These engagements provide valuable opportunities to share knowledge, learn from peers, and contribute to the continuous improvement of electoral administration.

Some of these include:



The Secretariat for Electoral Coordination (SEC): The SEC's mandate is to facilitate collaboration among Canadian electoral management bodies. The SEC supports the development and of modern and innovative electoral processes through the co-ordination of working groups, committees and projects that bring together election management professionals from across Canada. Elections Manitoba staff participated in a number of working groups and projects on the topics of deceptive online practices, enhancing Indigenous experience in democracy, accommodating voters with a disability, electoral finance, and the impact of artificial intelligence on elections.



Canadian Election Official Training (CEOT): CEOT is a collaborative effort between Canadian election management bodies that provides ongoing targeted professional development opportunities to election personnel across Canada. In 2024, Elections Manitoba CEO Shipra Verma led a seminar on executive leadership for elections, which was also attended by other Elections Manitoba staff. Staff also attended a seminar on cybersecurity for election officials. Elections Manitoba CEO Shipra Verma served as the chair of the CEOT steering committee.



Conference of Canadian Election Officials (CCEO): The CCEO is an annual conference that brings together Chief Electoral Officers and senior leadership from all 13 election management bodies in Canada. The Conference provides an opportunity to share best practices, discuss election administration strategy, explore collaborative initiatives in a Canadian context.



Canadian Elections Resource Library (CERL): CERL is an online resource library and forum supported by Elections Manitoba. It is a valuable tool for discussion, resource-sharing, and information-gathering among jurisdictions.



Conference of Government Ethics and Law (COGEL): COGEL is an international forum that brings together election officials, academics, and lawmakers to discuss issues around election administration, election financing, ethics and the law, privacy, conflict of interest, and communications. Elections Manitoba staff participated in the 2024 annual conference.



Canada Vote Summit: The Canadian Vote Summit is two-day event convened annually by the Democratic Engagement Exchange. The summit brings together election management officials, government officials, academics, journalists and community organizers to examine the challenges facing Canadian democracy. These topics included election modernization, election integrity, voter turnout, representation and misinformation. The summit was attended by Elections Manitoba CEO Shipra Verma.



Election observations: Elections Manitoba staff participated in election observation programs hosted by Elections New Brunswick and Elections Saskatchewan, plus a program to observe the 2024 United States federal election. These programs provided Elections Manitoba staff with valuable opportunities to learn from diverse electoral practices.




Other development opportunities: Staff members participated in the Province of Manitoba's Learning and Development program and other events through various professional organizations.

Looking Forward to 2025

Vote Anywhere Implementation


With the proposal to modify the voting process approved in December 2024, Elections Manitoba will begin planning to implement the changes. These changes add two extra days of advance voting, plus election day voting, at the local election office. This modification will also allow voting on election day at any local election office in the province.

The next steps will include adapting processes and training materials, reviewing space requirements for local election office locations, and determining election results reporting procedures for the next general election and any byelections that are held.



Returning Officer Recruitment

Recruitment of returning officers, assistant returning officers and support staff for the 44th general election will begin in 2025 with direct outreach to staff who worked in previous elections.



Implementing Strategic Initiatives

Elections Manitoba's new strategic plan sets our course for the next four years. In 2025, work is set to begin on implementing strategic initiatives. These initiatives include website modernization, improving accessibility, and bolstering internal procedures to support integrated project management.

VI. REPORT TO THE STANDING COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATIVE AFFAIRS

Modification to the Voting Process: Vote Anywhere in Manitoba on Election Day at Any Returning Office


In December 2024, Elections Manitoba received approval from the Standing Committee on Legislative Affairs to proceed with a modification to the voting process for the 44th provincial general election, and any byelection held before then.

The modification was used in the Transcona byelection held March 18, 2025. The modification was also used during the Spruce Woods byelection held on August 26, 2025. A report on the use of the modification in that byelection will be published at a later date.

Note: *The Elections Act* refers to the “returning office” as one place where advance voting must operate (section 125(4)) in each electoral division, as well as for numerous other activities. To make the activities of the returning office clearer, Elections Manitoba refers to returning offices as “local election offices” in public communications. To align with legislation, this report will use the term returning office.

What Changed

Three days of voting were added at the returning office. Advance voting was extended for two days — the Sunday and Monday immediately preceding election day — and election day voting was added. Voting opportunities at the returning office were expanded from eight to 11 days.



Under this model, eligible voters could cast a ballot outside of their home electoral division on election day, at any returning office in the province. However, during a byelection this is not applicable.



Voting Activity

In total, 417 votes were cast at the returning office, including 401 during advance voting and 16 on election day. For advance voting, this represents 20% of advance votes cast. Of note, the two highest single-day totals for advance voting at the returning office were on days where voting was not available at any other location: Sunday, March 16 and Monday, March 17.

Results Reporting

Under this model, the days of extended advance voting are reported as advance votes on the Statement of Official Results.

Election day voting at the returning office is reported as its own voting opportunity.

Given the number of votes cast, election day voting at the returning office results were combined with other voting opportunities on the Statement of Official Results to protect the secrecy of the vote.

Voting Process

- ▶ During all eleven days, a voter could go to the returning office to vote.
 - ▶ During a general election, eligible voters would be able to vote at any returning office. A ballot would be printed on demand for any voter voting outside of their electoral division.
- ▶ Currently, advance voting occurs at every returning office for eight days, ending the Saturday before election day. Under this modification, voting was extended for an additional three days, including election day.
- ▶ Voting proceeded as usual during advance voting:
 - ▶ A voting officer accessed the voters list on a secure laptop, checked the voter's ID, looked up the voter electronically, printed a label for insertion in the voting book, issued a ballot and struck the voter off the electronic voters list in real time.
 - ▶ The voter marked their paper ballot behind a privacy screen.
 - ▶ The paper ballot was inserted into a vote counting machine.
 - ▶ The vote counting machine was used to securely record the ballot and count the vote for the candidate of choice.
- ▶ Results of extended advance voting at the returning office were counted and reported on election night in the same manner as advance voting.
- ▶ Results of election day voting at the returning office were counted on election night in the same manner as regular election day voting, and reported as a unique voting opportunity.





Meeting Objectives

This modification to the voting process made voting more convenient for voters. The addition of three days of voting, including election day voting at the returning office, provided more opportunities for voters to cast a ballot.

This modification builds on existing processes and infrastructure. It makes use of voting equipment and technology already in place for advance voting. The voting process is the same as advance voting and requires no additional staff training.

Legislative Objectives as per section 28.1(2) of *The Elections Act*:

Conclusion

The proposed modification is set to be added to legislation in Bill 30, *The Election Financing Amendment And Elections Amendment Act*. At the time of writing, Bill 30 has received second reading in the Manitoba Legislative Assembly.



VI. RAPPORT AU COMITÉ PERMANENT DES AFFAIRES LÉGISLATIVES

Modification du déroulement du vote - Le jour du scrutin, votez dans n'importe lequel bureau du directeur du scrutin du Manitoba

En décembre 2024, le Comité permanent des affaires législatives a autorisé Élections Manitoba à apporter une modification au déroulement du vote pour la 44e élection générale provinciale et pour toute élection partielle précédant celle-ci. Cette modification a été appliquée durant l'élection partielle de Transcona, qui a eu lieu le 18 mars 2025.

Cette modification a également été appliquée durant l'élection partielle de Spruce Woods, qui a eu lieu le 26 août 2025. Un rapport sur l'utilisation de la modification lors de cette élection partielle sera publié à une date ultérieure.

Remarque : Conformément au paragraphe 125(4) de la *Loi électorale*, le « bureau du directeur du scrutin » est l'endroit où doit se dérouler le scrutin par anticipation et de nombreuses autres activités dans chaque circonscription électorale. Afin de mieux refléter les activités qui ont lieu dans les bureaux du directeur du scrutin, Élections Manitoba utilise l'appellation « bureaux électoraux locaux » pour désigner les bureaux du directeur du scrutin dans ses communications publiques. En conformité avec la législation, le présent rapport utilise l'appellation « bureau du directeur du scrutin ».

Ce qui a changé

Trois jours de scrutin ont été ajoutés au bureau du directeur du scrutin. On a prolongé de deux jours le scrutin par anticipation (le dimanche et le lundi précédant immédiatement le jour du scrutin), et le jour du scrutin peut maintenant se tenir au bureau du directeur du scrutin. Les possibilités de voter au bureau du directeur du scrutin sont ainsi passées de huit à onze jours.

Activité électorale

Au total, 417 votes ont été exprimés au bureau du directeur du scrutin, dont 401 lors du scrutin par anticipation et 16 lors du jour du scrutin. Les jours de prolongation du scrutin par anticipation représentent 20 % du total des votes par anticipation. Il convient de noter que les deux jours affichant les nombres les plus élevés de votes par anticipation au bureau du directeur du scrutin, soit le dimanche 16 mars et le lundi 17 mars, sont des jours où les électeurs ne pouvaient voter ailleurs.

Les votes exprimés le jour du scrutin au bureau du directeur du scrutin sont déclarés comme une possibilité de scrutin unique.

Compte tenu de leur nombre, les votes exprimés le jour du scrutin au bureau du directeur du scrutin ont été combinés aux autres possibilités de scrutin dans le relevé officiel du scrutin afin d'assurer le secret du scrutin.

Déroulement du vote

- ▶ Durant les onze jours du scrutin, un électeur pouvait se rendre au bureau du directeur du scrutin pour voter.
 - ▶ Durant une élection générale, les électeurs admissibles pourraient voter dans n'importe quel bureau du directeur du scrutin. Un bulletin de vote serait imprimé à la demande pour tout électeur votant ailleurs que dans sa propre circonscription électorale.
- ▶ À l'heure actuelle, le scrutin par anticipation a lieu dans chaque bureau du directeur du scrutin pendant une période de huit jours se terminant le samedi précédant le jour du scrutin. La modification proposée prévoit trois jours de scrutin supplémentaires au bureau du directeur du scrutin, ce qui inclut le jour du scrutin.
- ▶ Le scrutin par anticipation s'est déroulé comme à l'habitude.
 - ▶ Un scrutateur a accédé à la liste électorale sur un ordinateur portable sécurisé, a vérifié l'identité de l'électeur, a consulté la liste électorale électronique, a imprimé une étiquette afin de l'insérer dans le registre du scrutin, a remis un bulletin de vote et a radié le nom de l'électeur de la liste électorale électronique en temps réel.
 - ▶ L'électeur a marqué son bulletin de vote en papier derrière un isoloir.
 - ▶ Le bulletin de vote en papier a été inséré dans un appareil de dépouillement du scrutin.
 - ▶ L'appareil de dépouillement du scrutin a été utilisé pour enregistrer le bulletin de vote de manière sécurisée et dépouiller le scrutin.
- ▶ Les votes exprimés au cours de la période de prolongation du vote par anticipation au bureau du directeur du scrutin ont été dépouillés et déclarés le soir de l'élection, de la même manière que ceux exprimés au cours d'un scrutin par anticipation.
- ▶ Les votes exprimés le jour du scrutin au bureau du directeur du scrutin ont été dépouillés le soir de l'élection – de la même manière que ceux exprimés au cours d'une élection ordinaire – et ont été déclarés au titre d'une possibilité de scrutin unique.





Atteinte des objectifs

En vertu de la modification du déroulement du vote, les électeurs peuvent maintenant exprimer leur vote plus facilement. Les trois jours de scrutin supplémentaires au bureau du directeur du scrutin, ce qui inclut le jour du scrutin, ont donné aux électeurs plus de possibilités d'exprimer leur vote.




Conclusion
