
Have your ID ready

Three ways to prove your identity and address

1. One government-issued photo ID (federal, provincial, municipal) with your current address, such as:

- Driver's licence
- Manitoba Identification Card
- Any other government identification with your photo, name and current address

Or

One government-issued photo ID (federal, provincial, municipal) that does not include your current address, such as:

- Canadian Passport
- Indian Status Card
- Canadian Forces Photo Identification Card
- Any other government identification with your photo and name.

If the government photo ID does not have a current address, you will need to sign a form confirming your address.

2. Two pieces of ID:

Any combination of the following ID will be accepted. At least one must have your current address or you will need to take a declaration of address.

Electronic documents such as e-bills are acceptable forms of ID. Photos of ID are also acceptable.

3. Vouching (election day only)

If you are on the voters list on election day, and don't have ID with your name, you can take an oath and have someone who knows you vouch for you. This person must be on the voters list, show proof of identity and address, be registered in the same electoral division, take an oath and vouch for only one person.
